


October Book Club

The original investigator on the complaint left the department and a new one has been assigned.

Equal freedoms, then and now

The TriCounty Active Adult Center recently hosted a 60-year anniversary of the March on Washington. On that date, some 250,000 people marched in D.C., demonstrating for equal job opportunities and many other freedoms for African Americans.
