In memory of John Lewis

June 17 — the day civil rights icon John Lewis died — has become a national day of nonviolent action, with rallies throughout the country, including in Pottstown. For President Johnny Corson, it brought to mind when he and Paula met Lewis in 2015 after being invited to D.C. by then-U.S. Rep. Ryan Costello.

The event was the Congressional Commemoration of the 150th Anniversary Of the Ratification of the Thirteenth Amendment.

Corson remembers, "When we met Congressman Lewis, it was one of the most humbling moments of my life. The way he walked out of his office, and how his presence filled the room, I actually said in front of him and his staff that I was going to cry. And he said in his distinctive voice, 'young man, please do not cry!' "


All equipment needed to fish, kayak, and build confidence in the great outdoors will be provided.
