
Out and about

Book Club's Feb. choice

The group has selected *The Sun Does*Shine: How I Found Life and Freedom on
Death Row, by Anthony Ray Hinton.
We'll meet at 6 p.m. on Monday, Feb. 12,
in the Pottstown Library to discuss it.

In 1985, Hinton was arrested and charged with murder in Alabama. He was just 29. He knew it was a case of mistaken identity and believed he would be cleared.

But he had no money, and this was Alabama. Hinton spent his first three years on Death Row at Holman State Prison, despairing and angered. Eventually, he resolved to find a better way. For the next 27 years he transformed not only his own spirit, but also those of his fellow inmates, 54 of whom were executed mere feet from his cell. With the help of civil rights attorney Bryan Stevenson, Hinton won his release in 2015.

As usual, the library has reserved copies for us.


Winter Essentials Drive

A great week for the branch's book and literacy project




Not all weeks are this good. But here's an example of what's been happening:

<u>Friday, Jan. 12:</u> A tractor-trailer pulls up at the end of our suburban book shed location and offloads a pallet of 17 cartons onto a pick-up truck. We drive the truck to the shed and start unpacking and labeling the 984 books inside.

<u>Saturday</u>, <u>Jan. 13:</u> We hold a label party and finish labeling, then to sorting them for recipients.

By Wednesday, Jan. 17: 860 books had been delivered to 11 locations.
